Our two shops are run on the Broomfield site by our great volunteers.



SHOP 1 is situated by the South entrance and sells great coffee, sandwiches and other lunchtime snacks, cold drinks, fruit, confectionery and other hot drinks. It also holds a great selection of gifts and has a freezer full of ice cream and lollies.

It is a very busy shop providing a much needed service to those at the top end of the Broomfield site. It is open Monday to Friday, from 9am to 3pm. We also comply with the government regulations about the reduction in our stock of high fat and high sugar items.

The shop is run by Jenny Gillingham and Barbara Coupe who work tirelessly to make sure that it runs as efficiently as possible, ordering stock and ensuring the latest trends are taken into account.

The shop is open from Monday to Friday from 9am to 3pm and is manned by our great volunteers. It is run by Janet Warn who makes sure everything ticks over and is well stocked to meet demand.

As our shops are manned by volunteers, we do not pay any salaries. This means that every penny of profit made can be used to fund much needed equipment and services for the hospital. The shops are a vital part of the life of the hospital with our volunteers giving service with a smile, trying to brighten up each day for customers, patients and staff, and often going that extra mile.

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The Friends at Broomfield Hospital Fund £40,000 Equipment to Help Patients With Difficulty Swallowing



The Friends at Broomfield Hospital and the Speech and Language Therapy Team with the equipment

The Friends at Broomfield Hospital have funded state of the art technology to enable the Speech and Language Therapy team to provide advanced assessment for patients with swallowing and voice disorders.

Fibreoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES) will benefit a wide patient group who present with oropharyngeal dysphagia (difficulty swallowing). People with dysphagia frequently include those with neurological disorders, patients who have had an acute stroke, and those who have undergone treatment for head and neck cancer.

The use of this equipment is designed to reduce the risk of malnutrition, dehydration, aspiration pneumonia, prolonged tube feeding, readmission and to allow for a safer and faster discharge from hospital. It is also of benefit in the use of Videostroboscopy; allowing for detailed assessment and management of voice disorders. The equipment will be operated by speech and language therapists.

We have raised over £1.2 million and counting...



In 1940 Broomfield Hospital was built as a sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis patients, whose hospital stays could be anything between 6 months to about four years.

Towards the end of the second world war, 50% of the patients were ex-servicemen, who could of course come from all over the country. In 1948 the National Health Service was born, and a year later in 1949, a small group of philanthropic people got together to provide small comforts to these patients who were often a long way from home and family. They did whatever they could to make the patients lives a little more comfortable, giving soap, shampoos and other small gifts. This small group grew and in 1957 they were first registered as the 'League of Friends' whose only aim was to support Broomfield Hospital. That charitable aim is still the same today. The membership grew, as more people volunteered to help. The charity then decided to open a shop which operated out of a small shed at the front of the ward block (near where the mortuary is now). They sold sweets, drinks etc to the visitors and staff and the shop was manned entirely by volunteers, with all profits continuing to purchase small comforts for the patients.

Over the years the profit from this trading grew to such an extent that small items of much needed equipment began to be purchased by the Friends, like bedside

These requests vary from medical equipment, grants to enhance the environment both inside and outside the hospital, grants to support the staff and of course grants to help the patients so they have a positive experience whilst in hospital. These include toiletry bags, grants to the dignity project for clothing, the enhancing of day rooms, gardens and artworks.

Our only purpose then and now, is to support Broomfield Hospital. This is what we do. Providing

tables and curtains. A trolley service was set up to visit patients, then later a library service. A larger shop was opened in the ward block with a second one opening in the Atrium many years later. Larger refreshments at events, funding the extras for the hospital that cannot be funded by normal exchequer funding, taking an active part in the life of the hospital by providing

the Atrium many years later. Larger and larger pieces of equipment were purchased as the years went on, and trading in the busy shops increased, supported by patients, staff, and visitors.

All the staff were unpaid volunteers and continue to be so, which enables all profits generated to be used for the Hospital. The Friends give on average £50k to £60k in grants every year, responding to requests that come directly from the Trust.

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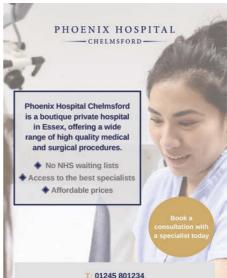

extras at Christmas, and most important of all showing a friendly, non clinical face to patients in what can be a most challenging and stressful environment.

Over the last ten years we have purchased larger and more complex pieces of equipment, and are often the key to services being able to progress quickly into new areas. We gave almost £40,000 to the Stroke service to purchase a machine to monitor swallowing in patients who have had a stroke.

We have also just donated £44,000 towards the new surgical robot at Broomfield, spread over three years. A remarkable development for our hospital. All of this is only possible because of our volunteers, who give their time freely and willingly to support our work, and we can only continue our work because of them.

The hours donated by these unsung heroes is truly remarkable. They all ensure that we continue to support this wonderful hospital, and long may it continue.

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The Friends at Broomfield Hospital Donate £44,000 to Robot Appeal



When the robot appeal for funding was launched, The Friends committed to donate a total of £50,000 over a three year period. The appeal for funds was actually closed earlier than expected which meant our total donation was £44,000 (rather than the £50,000 shown on the cheque). We were fortunate enough to have a demonstration of the Da Vinci robot from surgeon Sri Kadirkamanathan. Some of the ladies even had a go at operating the robot themselves.

The Friends' Janet Warn said: "When you see the robot, it really makes you appreciate what fundraising can do. It was great to get hands-on. We are all volunteers in the shops and on the trollies and all enjoy working here. It makes me want to work a few more hours now!" Fellow volunteer Carol Haensel also experienced the machine in action: "Using the robot was very therapeutic, like the Consultant told us it would be. It was amazing how dextrous you could be."

Surgeon Sri Kadirkamanathan said: "I'm absolutely delighted. We need a lot of funding for the robot and I'm really stunned and very grateful for the Friends support."

Charlotte Jefcoate, Fundraising Coordinator, at Mid and South Essex Hospitals Charity, was

thrilled with the Friends contribution: "The Friends are such an asset to the hospital. Their shops are fantastic value for money and you're always greeted with a smile. We would encourage all staff to use the Friends shops as much as possible because it all benefits the hospital. The Dignity Project





Mid and South Essex NHS Foundation Trust is supporting dignity in care, with a network of nearly 600 dignity champions within Broomfield Hospital. The project was originally set up by Angela Wade, Professional Development Lead Nurse, to work on creating a dignified environment for our patients, visitors and staff, with three core improvement projects around behaviour, environment and, patient clothing.

By listening to patients and staff, the team has introduced privacy windows in the stroke unit and elderly care wards, and the dermatology outpatients department having privacy improved in their waiting area. They have also purchased 50 personal listeners and 20 desktop hearing loops to support those who have hearing loss during their hospital visits, made possible through the kind donations from the Friends at Broomfield.

There are are many amenities provided via the project including modesty theatre gowns for patients and 'winter warmer' packs for some of the most vulnerable patients on the emergency floor. A group of local knitters provide patients with hand-crafted, homely blankets and quilts to make a stay in hospital a little more bearable and it is with thanks to the Friends at Broomfield generosity, the team can fund the purchase of new clothes for patients who find themselves in hospital following an emergency admission.

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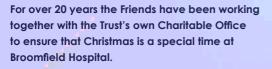
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How the Friends at Broomfield Hospital Celebrate Christmas

COVID-19 GUIDANCE FOR VISITORS

To keep our patients, visitors and staff safe – and to limit the spread of COVID-19 - we have had to restrict the number of people allowed on to our hospital sites.

We know that it's hugely important for patients to see their loved ones while they are in hospital, so have done all we can to support people to keep in contact while keeping them as safe as possible.

The information below sets out what visiting is allowed in each area, although there may be variations in certain circumstances to ensure everyone's safety. Our staff will keep you informed.

Importantly, it should always be the same visitors – so not multiple friends and family on different days. Unfortunately, children are not allowed to visit, and all visitors will have to wear a mask or face covering at all times. If you don't have one, we will provide one for you.

We really appreciate the support of our patients, visitors and community as our staff continue to work hard to care for everyone who needs us.

GENERAL WARD AREAS

One visitor a day for one hour. There will be two sessions: 3-4pm and 5.30-6.30pm.

Patients and visitors will be informed about their allocated time.

Unfortunately visitors are not allowed on our COVID-19 wards, so our staff will keep the patients' next of kin fully updated about their condition.

SURGICAL WARDS/GREEN ZONE

As patients who have had surgery are more susceptible to COVID-19 we cannot allow visitors in these areas.

END OF LIFE CARE

Where patients are nearing the end of their life, two visitors can be with them at any time.

CRITICAL CARE

Unfortunately visitors will not be allowed in our Critical Care areas except for End Of Life care, but our staff will keep the patient's next of kin fully updated.

PAEDIATRICS

One parent or carer can be with their child at any time and they are allowed to stay overnight.

NEONATAL ICU

Parents or carers will be allocated three hour slots on a rota basis. Our staff will keep you fully informed.





LABOUR WARD/BIRTHING UNIT

Women admitted to Labour Ward/ Midwifery Led Birthing Unit to have one birth partner accompanying for assessment. To remain with women during birth.

Women admitted to Labour Ward for reasons outside of Labour can have one person with them during admission.

ANTENATAL

Women coming in for Induction of Labour (IOL) to have a birth partner attend for start of IOL procedure and then return home. To be called back if women is transferred to Labour Ward or if contracting and needs support during this time.

Visiting on Antenatal Ward for all inpatients to be commenced 2 hours in the afternoon/evening. Staggered times arranged per bed number.

Only one visitor each session and this needs to be a consistent visitor. Same visiting applied to Antenatal patients who remain on Labour ward.

Partners accompanying for scans to continue as currently in place.

POSTNATAL

Visiting to be increased from 1 hour in the afternoon/evening to 2 hours. Staggered

times depending on bed numbers. Same visiting applied to Post Natal patients who remain on Labour ward.

All visitors to have details taken and temp checks on arrival and to wear face masks unless in a delivery room.

ULTRASOUND SCANS

One person can accompany you, but care must be taken to maintain social distancing in waiting areas.

EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT AND ASSESSMENT UNITS

This will be looked at on a case by case basis so we can maintain social distancing in the unit while supporting those who are particularly vulnerable or unwell.

OUTPATIENTS

Patients should come in on their own unless they need assistance and/or have been asked to bring someone with them.

Broomfield Hospital welcomes visitors and understands the important part they play in patient's recovery. Family and friends are able to visit patients every day. The hospital's visiting hours vary from ward to ward, so please contact the main switchboard or website for information.

Visitors are respectfully requested to limited visits to two people at any one time where possible, and that they stay for short periods of time using the chairs provided by the patient's bed. This helps prevent the ward area becoming too noisy and overcrowded for those patients who need rest. If children wish to visit, please check with the nurse in charge for advice about this.

To reduce the risk of infection spreading, alcohol gel is available at the entrance to the wards and at each bedside. All visitors are asked to use this when entering and leaving a ward.

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Recipe: Baked Chicken Fajitas



Ingredients (for 6 servings):

- 450g boneless skinless
 chicken breasts, cut into thin strips.
- 1 can (400g) diced tomatoes and green chilies, drained.
- 1 medium onion, cut into thin strips.
- 1 medium green pepper, cut into thin strips.
- 1 medium sweet red pepper, cut into thin strips.
- 2 tablespoons canola oil.
- 2 teaspoons chili powder.
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin.
- 1/4 teaspoon salt.
- 12 flour tortillas (6 inches), warmed.

Preparation method

 In a 13x9-in. baking dish coated with cooking spray, combine the chicken, tomatoes, onion and peppers. Combine the oil, chili powder, cumin and salt. Drizzle over chicken mixture; toss to coat.

 Bake, uncovered, at 200 (180°C fan) 20-25 minutes or until chicken is no longer pink and vegetables are tender. Spoon onto tortillas; fold in sides.

Serve the tortillas with sour cream, grated cheese, salsa and a side of wedges!



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Recipe: Lemon Crumble Cake





For the Crumble 50g (2oz) Golden Granulated Sugar 25g (1oz) Plain Flour Grated Rind 1 Lemon 25g (1oz) Butter

For the Cake 225g (8oz) Plain Flour 1/2 Teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda Grated Rind and Juice 1 Lemon 100g (31/2oz) Butter 125g (51/2oz) Caster Sugar 225g (8oz) Buttermilk 2 Eggs, Lightly Beaten

Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan/350F/Gas Mark 4). Lightly grease and line a 900g/2lb loaf tin.

Serves 16.

To make the crumble mixture, in a bowl stir together the sugar, flour and lemon rind, rub in the butter until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs. Set aside.

For the cake, sift together the flour and bicarbonate of soda into a bowl. Stir in the lemon rind. Place the butter and lemon juice into a pan and heat until melted. Stir in the sugar, buttermilk and eggs.

Pour into the flour mixture and combine well. Pour into the tin, smooth out then sprinkle over the crumble mixture and press down lightly.

Bake for about 1 hour or until well risen and golden. Leave to cool in the tin for about 30 minutes, then serve.
